MAY

RACGP Accreditation

In May last year, all Derbarl services were assessed by Australian General Practice Accreditation Ltd (AGPAL) assessors against the Royal Australian College of General Practitioners standard practice.

Preparing and strengthening our accreditation and compliance measures and infection control standards was a tremendous team effort that resulted in the AGPAL accreditors finding Derbarl met standards to achieve RACGP accreditation for all Clinics.

JUNE

Mental Health Accreditation

In June, we achieved inaugural accreditation against the National Standards for Mental Health Services. Attaining the mental health accreditation provided acknowledgement and recognition of our high-level capability to deliver mental health and Social and Emotional Wellbeing (SEWB) Services. This is a testament to the dedicated team we have working at Derbarl.

This accreditation provides us with a solid foundation for continuous quality improvement in our mental health and SEWB services; and holds us in good stead in applying for SEWB expansion.

JULY

New Services

Derbarl attracted funding for three new services to complement our comprehensive primary health care model and suite of services. Derbarl is one of 7 AHCWA pilot sites to deliver a (non-crisis) Family and Domestic Violence program (FDV).

The program aims to support the safety and wellbeing of Aboriginal people affected by FDSV and promote community safety. Since commencing, the program has managed a full caseload and continues to advocate for appropriate funding to deal with community need and preventive support services.

Derbarl is one of 23 NACCHO pilot sites across the country to deliver the Culture, Care Connect program – an Aftercare Suicide Prevention service.

The program brings together key streams of suicide prevention planning, coordination, and activity across Perth metro, including raising awareness, early intervention, crisis management and support to the Community. Aftercare Workers provide support to mob who have been referred following a suicide attempt or suicidal crisis through wrap around support including referral pathways and coordinated care and support to individuals and families to prevent suicides.



After almost 7 years, we also reclaimed the Tackling Indigenous Smoking (TIS) program.

The Derbarl TIS 'Wugen Wal-yan' program has renewed focus on improving exposure and engagement with communities to reduce smoking uptake and rates including vaping and e-cigarettes. It focuses on community education and engagement, smoke free policies, mass and social media campaigns and promotional resources and events. Since mobilising the program, the team have delivered over 67 events and education sessions.

Our SEWB team onboarded a Strong Spirit Strong Mind Youth Project. The project works with our young people to improve their social and emotional wellbeing and awareness of risks associated with alcohol and other drug use.

AUGUST

Midland Project

Following cultural clearance from Elders, the board approved the purchase of 11 The Avenue as the property to develop for our new Midland Clinic. The property is 750 square metres in size and will require a complete fit-out.

Derbarl will take full possession and commence refurbishment of the property on 1 July 2024. A Construction Project Manager has been appointed to manage the refurbishment of the property.

The \$4.7M funding for the new Midland clinic was an election promise from the Albanese government.

SEPTEMBER

50th Anniversary Elders Luncheon

Team Derbarl assisted in making our community launch for our 50th anniversary, a momentous celebration for many of our founders, life members, past and current directors, members, patients and visitors. The work of the team truly defined the team Derbarl ethos.

At the launch in late September, we heard from one of Derbarl's first employees and Elder, Aunty Marian Kickett, Founding Member, Aunty Marie Bartlett and current CEO, Tracey Brand, the story of the Derbarl Yerrigan Health Service; spanning over half a century it is one of pioneering activism, leadership and growth and never giving up.

At the time we were founded in 1973, the infant mortality for Aboriginal bubs was 120 to 1000 live births, today we are 5.8 to 1000. Life expectancy for Aboriginal men was 52 years and women 54, today our men are living to an average of 71.6 years and women 75.6 and while these are good improvements, there is so still much to be done to close the gap in health inequality.

The AMS opened its doors with a modest \$100,000 budget, today, we have an annual budget of \$22.7M. Patient numbers grew from 800 patients in 1973 to over 8,000 in 1981, which doubled 9 years later to 16,000 patients in 1990 and today we have 24,062 patients. In 1976, patient numbers were rising to 600 a month with many first-time patients, today an average of 8,500 patients access care across Derbarl's 4 clinics every month.



Today, we have 100,000 patient contacts and provide over 57,000 episodes of care each year.

Looking back over 50 years, the service started with 5 staff including 1 GP, 2 RNs, 1 AHP and 1 Social Worker – today we have 166 staff (138 FT). We are the largest ACCHO employer of Aboriginal Health Practitioners in the country and likely one of the few health services that have 5 Aboriginal doctors. We continue an important role in training Aboriginal Health Practitioners and medical students including GP Registrars. Over the last two years, our Aboriginal GPRs have consequently won the GPR in Training Award for the state (Dr Corey and Dr Dan).

Our second largest clinic, Midland, was opened in 1998 and was forced to close in 2001 due to insufficient funding. It reopened in March 2003 and closed in October of the same year and in

2012 reopened again in new premises with more sustained funding. 10 years later in 2022, \$4.7M was announced for a new Derbarl owned Midland Clinic.

From humble beginnings that started with volunteers in a run-down old city building to expanding to four clinics, 24,000 patients and becoming the oldest and largest Aboriginal community-controlled health service in Western Australia and one of the first in the country.

As we celebrated 50 years, the RACGP announced Derbarl as the best GP service in the state – it is a remarkable achievement.

Derbarl's 50-year journey is a tremendous example of an Aboriginal community-controlled health self-determinant organisation by which the Aboriginal community has taken Aboriginal health into Aboriginal hands and achieved great success. This is what happens when Aboriginal people have a voice. Lives are saved and health improvements happen.

Speeches acknowledged and paid respect to our 10 founding members, 44 life members, the 113 past and current community- elected directors and our incredible staff who have served Derbarl over our 50 years. These people are all integral in this milestone achievement.





































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


We were fortunate to attract some great sponsorship that made the event possible.

NOVEMBER

AGM

On 18 November, the Derbarl Yerrigan Health Service held its Annual General Meeting. The AGM covered off on all business and members supported all proposed resolutions. Paediatric Funding

Derbarl has fiercely advocated for funding to provide timely assessment and diagnosis of children and young people with suspected developmental delays. Derbarl also presented to the Inquiry into Child Development Services Western Australia.

In November, we received the exciting news that our funding applications for the Telethon Foundation and Stan Perron Foundation were successful for our Paediatric Service.

The funding will allow us to maintain our existing multi-disciplinary team, bolster our services and expand allied health services with a social worker and clinical psychologist. While this level of funding is welcomed, it is philanthropic and short term.

The Derbarl CEO, Deputy Medical Director and Paeds team met with NACCHO and welcomed their support for recurrent sustainable funding in this space.

DECEMBER

Cultural Safety Framework

Derbarl's Cultural Safety Framework was launched at our Staff Summit in December. The framework has been built upon the cultural intelligence of our Aboriginal staff and received endorsement by the Derbarl Aboriginal Advisory Committee.

The Cultural Governance Framework will ensure cultural safety is at the centre of everything we do.

It will be Derbarl's strategic and operational guide to promoting holistic health, wellbeing and wellness that is free from racism, discrimination, and lateral violence for Aboriginal people, carers, families, and communities on Wadjuk Noongar Boodjar.

Elder Care Program

Derbarl received funding under tranche 2 for an Elder Care program. The program aims to deliver care support, connection, and coordination to elder patients and their families.

It will allow Derbarl to work with our Elderly patients and their families to ensure they are supported to understand, navigate, and access aged care services they are entitled to receive.



2024

JANUARY

Health Service for Juvenile Centre

Derbarl's proposal to the Department of Justice to deliver a health service model for Aboriginal children and young people in the Banksia and Casuarina juvenile centres was significantly downsized through a tender. The tender was not financially, clinically, or reputationally viable for Derbarl. The government, however, is willing to work with Derbarl on an agreeable model.

The leadership team is doing some further engagement with other ACCHOs delivering health services in justice facilities and will reopen negotiations with the department to work on an agreeable model. Derbarl is committed to providing health care and coordination of wrap around supports for our children and young people in the justice system. We continue to advocate for investments to prevent our children engaging with the justice system.

Derbarl also participated in the National Review of First Nations Health Care in Prisons - Roundtable meeting. We hope our position will lead to Aboriginal people in the justice system receiving a culturally safe, comprehensive primary health care service, as well as through care and investment in early years interventions.

FEBRUARY

We were saddened to hear of the passing of (Aunty) Dr Lowitja O'Donoghue on Sunday 4 February, and extended our sincere sorrow to her family, friends, and colleagues. We pay tribute to her remarkable legacy.

Lowitja dedicated her life to advocating and driving policy change for Aboriginal health, education, land rights and reconciliation and eloquently held government accountable for actions and decisions impacting our people.

Her formidable legacy will continue to be felt by future generations. While we mourn her passing, we also celebrate a great life that inspires all our people across the country.

New Programs

Derbarl has been pursuing funding to reignite our popular Heart Health Program. The National Heart Foundation Chief Executive Officer, David Lloyd, his team and Francene Eades from East Metro Health Service met with Derbarl to discuss reviving the Heart Health program.

Planning to relaunch our Heart Health program is gaining momentum with funding from the Health Foundation and in-kind support from EMHS. We remain hopeful that the program will be reignited this year.







Arnold Yarran Yarning Circle

In February, we officially opened the Arnold Yarran Yarning Circle.

This project was a vision of Uncle Arnold about 7 years ago after he saw a yarning circle in Northam.

We have all seen over the years, Uncle has been the accidental counsellor as mob come and yarn with him in the East Perth gardens. He talked about this project for many years before Derbarl committed to making his dream a reality.

The Yarning Circle provides a safe place for mob to gather to have yarns, to heal, to connect with each other, to share worries, to hear what's happening in Derbarl and to feel safe and culturally connected and supported.

It is already proving to be an empowering space to share stories, wisdom and laughter. We thank Unc for persevering with his vision.

The opening was incorporated into the Elders Yarning Group and it was so lovely to see our Elders as proud as Uncle and Team Derbarl and providing their support for this project.

A big crowd turned up for the event. Our koorlangkas learnt how to write their feelings using rhymes, which they then sang in hip hop.














Barry Cameron Memorial Basketball Carnival
